





## **Warrington Town Centre Crawl**

Our 'mature' footballers' real ale crawl took us to Warrington Town centre in March. For a few 'out of towners' it was with apprehension that they stepped off the train (in a town centre which shall we say has not had the best of press in recent years) and headed for our pre-arranged meeting at the Blue Bell. Alas, disappointingly, although the bar was lit up, the pub was shut. Not a good start to our crawl.





The Lower Angel is a real gem of a town centre pub; a plain traditional two bar boozer that has changed little in the passing decades. A blackboard displayed the array of ales on offer and Aiden, the smartly dressed barman, explained the differences in the ales. The other side of the pub had a number of gentlemen who all looked to be in deep discussion, probably analysing why it seemed to be so warm in the side we were in. After inspecting the list of ales available I opted for the Downton Elderquad. Just my type of beer, light in colour with a refreshing citrus flavour, and in fine form. I marked this ale a 4 on the CAMRA beer quality scale; excellent. Following that I tried the Thwaites Wainwrights 4.1% a straw-coloured malty beer, not my favourite I have to say but enjoyable all the same.

On went the coats for the stroll down a deserted Bridge Street to Friar Penketh a typical standard large Wetherspoons outlet. Quite a tickers pub from the number of micro brewery beers on offer. Here I opted for the Northern Okeh at 3.9%. A large number of attendees were availing themselves of the low priced food with many tables being used for diners, so the pub seemed quite full.

Leaving the Friar Penketh we crossed Bridge Street down Academy Way to the Porter's Ale House (previously named Cross Keys); a pub I had never been in. I have heard it is a pub of unusual characteristics and, after reading Gary Chester's report in the last issue of Out Inn Cheshire, I couldn't wait. What a pub! It has to be the friendliest pub in Warrington; lots of tattoos, body piercing and leather jackets on view and a unique atmosphere with the back room playing actual black plastic seven inch records of Suzi Quattro, Deep Purple and the like. No posing spotty teenagers drinking sugary blue liquid from bottle at over £6 a pint; just honest real ale for honest real people who appreciate a vibrant

town centre drinking pub. Jerry and Ben behind the bar were most hospitable, chatting to a group of un-pierced, un-tattooed, short haired, clean shaven men... (us). The pub offers 4 constantly changing guest beers with a view to installing a real cider in the very near future. Along with a couple of others, I ordered the Batemans XB. After a few whiffs and a couple of sips I decided it could be on the turn and asked the bar staff for their opinion.

They immediately offered another beer with no questions asked and were very apologetic.

I opted for the Titanic New World a beer I have not tried before. As usual for Titanic beers it was superb and I gave the beer a 4. I had to have another just to




make sure. The lads in the group (whom I am trying to convert to real ale) thought the pub was fantastic, so unlike the usual plastic pubs offering expensive boring plastic beer by plastic bar staff.

On we went after a farewell from the staff who came outside to cheer us off. On to the **Tavern** on the junction of Mersey Street and Church Street. A wonderful array of gleaming beer engines greeted us, with quite a different atmosphere from Porters with the emphasis defiantly on drinking beer. I sampled the George Wright Pure Blond at 4.6%, very nice earning a score of 3+. After the lads read all the posters and rugby shirts on show we moved on the nearby **Bull's Head**.

On offer here were a couple of national giants, Fuller's London Pride and Wells' Bombardier. Less exciting in my opinion than the ales on offer at the previous four pubs. Despite two beer engines displaying the Bombardier beer clips, neither were serving beer... we all had the Fullers which was in average condition. We made a return to the Porters for a last pint. I had the Everard's Pitch Black, a delicious pint of stout with flavours of roasted malt and coffee. Porters Ale House was a real find for our group, and enjoyed by the *Guinness* and *lager* drinkers as well. In all a very enjoyable evening, with the highlight being the excellent Porters Ale House, also first class were the Lower Angel and the Tavern.

Another club now worthy of consideration is the Grappenhall and Thelwall **Royal British Legion Club** on Stockport Road (Thelwall side of the A50 and just off the A56). Currently there are two hand pumps; one serving a Thwaites beer; the other a guest usually from micros. Hopefully a third pump will be installed shortly. With a beer festival on 7th and 8th August, it must be worth a visit.



#### SQUEEZING THROUGH THE CROWD AT THE FREEMASONS ARMS

One of the joys of delivering Out Inn Cheshire is savouring the differences between the pubs. One lunchtime I popped in to one very large pub with an almost empty car park and only two people in the open plan bar area; and they looked as though they didn't want anyone to see them. I had a nice half of Brakspear and went on my way, wondering how the pub survived.

Then on to what has been described by its friends as the epitome of a back street pub; although the **Freemasons Arms** is actually on the main Chester road in Northwich. I had to offer excuses as I squeezed my way between a crowd of jovial gentlemen chatting and supping glorious pints of guest bitter. The repartee and friendliness filled the, admittedly small, bar areas. I was instantly made welcome; and I trust this was not only because I looked like a fellow pensioner! This is what a traditional pub is all about. I managed to find one of the free seats and join the fun. I asked if many young people patronised the pub and was told "a few" and then my attention was drawn to a young man who had just reached retirement age! I rued the fact that this happy real ale oasis was not nearer to my home and wrenched myself away.

I am lucky to have fairly good health and the Warrington area provides ample opportunities to walk or cycle through pleasant countryside on the way to welcoming hostelries. One of my favourite decisions is to sit astride my mountain bike on the banks of the St Helens (Sankey) Canal and toss up whether to go left to end up at the **Fiddle I'th Bag** or right to the **Ferry Tavern**.

The young couple who run the Ferry have a range of special events running throughout the Summer including the famous Vintage Car Show and the musical feast known as Glastonferry.

Both are individual pubs with real character and, perhaps more importantly, a range of interesting beers. One can usually bet that they will be thronged too. I suppose a pub with no customers is second only to a pub with no beer in terms of horror. Unfortunately many of our pubs are closing because of the double whammy of increasing costs and diminishing numbers of customers. Hopefully, dear reader, you will be inspired to visit one of our advertisers or pubs that are mentioned in these pages. They deserve your support and will give you a great deal of pleasure.

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### CHANGING FORTUNES OF A VILLAGE LOCAL

When we first came to Farndon around twenty years ago, the liveliest pub of the three village establishments was **The Raven**. Over 100 years ago, this was the "brewery tap" for the Farndon Brewery, before the latter was sold to Chester Lion Brewery around 1910, then closed soon after though the name and the premises live on as Brewery Motors, along Churton Road.

Landlords came and went in the early 1990s, including Brummie Dave who once shaved off half his beard for charity, before the occupancy passed to the Bouchier family who somewhat pretentiously renamed the pub as **The Farndon Arms**. Decent ale and a quirky food menu were the early hallmarks of the Bouchier time, plus the TV exposure whenever local resident Paul Burrell was in the news. TV crews would take over the bar and try to capture the ambience of the (in)famous butler's local. Residents' opinion of this time in the spotlight was mixed.

The Bouchiers quit the pub after thirteen years and were followed briefly by John Gartland who was in the end unable to overcome the burdens of absurd rent and beer prices imposed by the owning PubCo, and the pub closed its doors some two years ago. A massively expensive refit, and another name change to The Farndon saw the pub reopened with a décor more in keeping with a Hampstead wine bar, no doubt influenced by similar pub refits nearby. However this one failed spectacularly, with the formula of expensive menus and lavish residential accommodation failing to attract sufficient custom, despite the efforts of no fewer than five managers in a little over twelve months.

Local residents Peter Dickinson and John Palmer took on the lease at the turn of the year, and are busy trying to turn the place into more of a pub, less of a fancy restaurant. With a focus on cask beers, many locally produced, and attention to ambience and friendliness, things are now finally looking up for the old lady. There is even talk of reviving the Raven name (the ghost of Joe Salmon, last owner of Farndon Brewery and the Raven would raise his pint glass to this). What a shame some idiot broke the etched glass "The Raven" windows during the mega-refit. Good luck to Peter and John.

### IN THE COUNTRY

The **Copper Mine** at Broxton reopened in May after a refit and has been re-christened the Sandstone. Happily it's blessed with being free of tie and was recently selling Fullers London Pride with <u>LocAles</u> Sandstone Edge (no relation) and Weetwood Cheshire Cat.

There's been a change of licensees at the **Plough** in Christleton (pictured). The previous incumbents, who only last year won a national gastropub title, left suddenly in acrimonious circumstances over alleged rent increases or monies owed depending on whose side you were on. The landlord of the **Cherry Orchard** in Boughton is to take over following refurbishment and one hopes the resident Spitting Feathers LocAles survive.

Not that we wish to decry national and regional beers; indeed we welcome any well-conditioned cask ale in a



pub; but the rural east side of Chester is a tad repetitive. A recent survey of the thirteen real ale pubs between the A51 and A56 (just two keg), revealed only the **Farmers Arms** and the **Morris Dancer** in Kelsall as serving up a local brew (Weetwood). No doubt reflecting beer tie purchasing obligations, dominating the hand pumps were the likes of Marstons Pedigree, Taylor Landlord, Wadworths 6X, Banks Bitter, Wells Bombardier and especially Black Sheep Bitter.

This is such a contrast with the stretch down the A41 to Whitchurch where freehouses exist. Consequently here you find that quirkier, tastier independent brews abound and sell with as much, if not more, flourish then the familiar brands. Curses to the Pub Co.



The intimate, food-led **Calveley** Arms in Handley; too easily overlooked courtesy of the by-pass; continues to sell some fine real ales on its hand pumps; Purple Moose Snowdonia Ale, Sharp's Doombar and Flower's IPA being recent examples.

CAMRA has been promoting mild throughout the month of May and two places were you can drink the stuff in south Cheshire are the **Red Lion** in Malpas which serves Theakstons Mild and the **Queens Head** at Sarn which stocks, unusually for the north west, Taylor Golden Best; a pale amber variety of the genre.

The **White Horse** at Great Barrow has submitted plans to convert one of the downstairs rooms in the pub into a village shop. Prince Charles would be proud. This follows the closure of the village store and post office. Good luck to this unpretentious little local which sells Banks Bitter plus a guest which was Bombardier Burning Gold last time out.

Pryors Heyes Golf Club in Oscroft now has real ale from nearby Weetwood.

## **BREWERY NEWS**

Diaries at the ready. Spitting Feathers will be hosting another of their highly popular **West Cheshire Beer Festivals** at their farm in Waverton on July 18th. To celebrate May Mild Month over forty firkins of their Velvet Mild were sent out to the free-trade while a few casks were sold at the Brewery Tap. In the meantime they've also produced a new light coloured 4.0% ale called 1862 to honour the year in which the farm was built. It's described as zesty, dry, fresh and hoppy.

Success for Mickle Trafford based **WC Brewery!** Their Gypsy's Kiss was declared winner in the Best Bitter category for the CAMRA Merseyside, Cheshire & North Wales region when tastings were held at the Liverpool Beer Festival. Their most recent creations however were two beers named, as ever, with yet more scatological connotations. Le Chat Noir was originally 5% and described as dark and delicious while Slow Motion Stout, available all too briefly at Telford's Warehouse and the Frodsham Beer festival, weighed in at 4.1% and had lots of roasted coffee and chocolate flavours.

### CHESTER SNIPPETS

The **Ship Inn** presented for three years a depressing welcome to Handbridge for anyone crossing over the Olde Dee Bridge from Chester. Boarded up with metal sheeting on the doors and windows there seemed little hope for its revival. Happily though, a colossal new makeover has transformed it from a one-time two-roomed local into a glass-fronted upmarket bar and restaurant. Traditionalists might moan but the interior has a smart blend of furniture, wooden floors and a mix of white-walls and exposed brick adorned with a fantastic collection of local framed pictures. Also hard to miss are the lengthy blackboard menus, a gigantic abacus and an impressive Ship Inn tiled wall behind the bar. Up a stairwell featuring former Ship Inn and Greenall's signs the restaurant is decorated with adverts for D'Oyly Carte posters and Bisto adverts while a gazebo like structure overlooks Edgar's Fields. Beer wise – ah, yes, beer – there are four hand pumps and on opening night these were three ales from Thwaites plus Black Sheep Bitter, all at £2.80 a pint. Our friends at Sandstone Brewery assure us a cask of their beer is scheduled to appear soon so hopefully 'quirkier' local beers will be a regular item (surely something it needs if it's to boost wet sales and lure in folk from the Brewery Tap and the Bear & Billet just 'across the water'). May God bless the Ship and all who ale in her.

The unreliable quality of real ale at the **Square Bottle** Wetherspoons on Foregate Street should now be a thing of the past. There's been a marked improvement since the arrival of a new shift manager who once worked as cellar man at the Good Beer Guide-listed Scarborough Arms in Leeds. Aware that the pub had a deservedly poor reputation for its ales, staff are now working extremely hard to improve on this image. Quality was indeed excellent during the recent Wetherspoons beer festival.

Boughton Hall Cricket Club, in conjunction with the Beer Festival Company, staged a very successful fezza over the Easter weekend. Not sure which was more impressive; the bewildering array of hand pumps or the sumptuous marquee complete with chandelier. It proved to be a welcome addition to the social calendar and one that certainly introduced real ale to many folk unfamiliar to its delights. Take the Chester Ladies Hockey Club for instance. They're probably more used to drinking Fosters out of a watering can but they definitely seemed to like the proper stuff!

We've been getting plenty of rave reviews for the **Bridge Inn** in Boughton recently; not that it wasn't already on our radar. Folk should not overlook this roadhouse pub when heading to or from town. A pleasant stroll from the city centre along the Shropshire Canal, it stocks Wells Bombardier plus changing guests ales and has recently installed a fourth hand pump as cask sales have taken off. Watch out too for bargain deals on their already good value quality food.

For the second time in three years **Old Harker's Arms** has won the branch's Cheshire Pub of the Year. Congrats to Paul Jeffreys and his staff. They may soon have some neighbourhood competition though. **Eaton Hotel** on City Road have plans for a new bar called the **Canalside**. Not only is real ale expected but even a small in-house brewery has been mooted.

The **Temple Bar**, an unlikely venue for cask and therefore all the more worthy of mention, has joined the <u>LocAle</u> scheme. It always sells a Spitting Feathers beer.

The **Ship Victory** wants a mention, so here you are Joe. Apparently uniquely named in the pub world, this community-focused local sells Tetley's and a guest ale.

The *Cross Keys* on Lower Bridge Street is shut. Ironic really as this area of town, which already boasted numerous restaurants and the **Bear & Billet**, has been rejuvenated with the opening of the **Brewery Tap** and **Oddfellows**.

Congratulations to management and staff of the GBG-listed **Telford's Warehouse** on receiving the Bar of the Year award at the Chester Food and Drink festival



### **DOWN ELLESMERE PORT WAY**

A CAMRA life member has drawn our attention to the **Halfway House** in Childer Thornton, a pub that is often and unfairly overlooked in favour of its near neighbour the Thwaites-tied **White Lion**. A former coaching inn lying on the main A41, it derives its name from being equidistant from Chester and Birkenhead and, while it might not do food, it remains a proper drinkers pub where landlord Chris O'Grady has been making valiant efforts to encourage locals to try the cask. Currently he has three hand pumps serving Banks Bitter and a couple of rotating guest ales from the Marstons stable which includes the likes of Jennings, Ringwood and Brakspear.

Nearby, and equally deserving of mention, is the Cask Marque approved **Chimneys** at the A41 Hooton lights where staff take pride in the quality of their real ale. The pub is part of the Vintage Inns group and they staged a beer festival in March; an event which featured Timothy Taylors Golden Best, UBU Purity, Caledonian Deuchars and Harviestoun's Bitter and Twisted. Additionally they always have Black Sheep Bitter available and try to have Cains whenever possible as it's a local favourite.

Good reports from **Thomas Telford** who tell us more and more people are drinking the real ale. This JD Wetherspoons pub in Ellesmere Port centre received full marks on all five pumps when undergoing its latest Cask Marque inspection.

Finally, we report the demise of another pub. The *Grosvenor Arms* on Upper Mersey Street, which had been shut for eons, is being converted to a nursing home.



## Pub of the Year 2009

Voting took place at March's branch meeting for our English Pub of the Year for 2009. After a show of hands, the winner was announced as **Old Harkers Arms** in Chester. Having already won this prestigious award in 2007, landlord Paul Jeffery and his staff have continued to serve a whole variety of superbly kept changing micro-brew beers at this canal-side marvel.

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
